#### Lasting Impact [Psalm 119] Draft by Steve Carr [www.houseofcarr.com/thread]

### INTRODUCTION

- 1. A few years ago, I picked up marathon running, which is an odd hobby.
  - a. It's a test of endurance: not can you run fast, but can you run long.
  - b. The "glory" of this run for me was in 2011's Flying Pig where I knew the lay of the land.1) My attempts to get on television worked (videos parts 1, 2, and 3).
  - c. What's even crazier: now ultramarathons are growing in popularity.
  - d. Apparently 26.2miles just isn't enough; people want to go farther.
- 2. The world's longest running race takes place in Queens, New York.
  - a. It's a multiday race in which participants have 52 days in which to run 3,100 miles.
  - b. Runners run 5649 laps of one extended city block in the neighborhood.
  - c. They have to average 60 miles every day to complete the race in time.
  - d. It takes place in June-August, making it even more challenging.
- 3. Summer is the time when we think of extending time and opportunities.
  - a. In fact, this Friday is June 21<sup>st</sup>. It is the summer solstice: the longest day of the year.
  - b. To illustrate: in Anchorage, Alaska, the sun will rise at 4:20AM, setting at 11:42PM
  - c. What better opportunity, then, to examine the longest chapter in the Bible?

## TRANSITION

1. Psalm 119 is the longest psalm and the longest chapter in the Bible: 176 verses.

- a. The psalm is an acrostic or alphabetic psalm
  - 1) 22 different sections, each beginning with a letter of Hebrew alphabet
  - 2) In each section, there are 8 couplets, starting with that particular letter.
- b. This makes for 176 total verses/sections
- 2. In short, the longest chapter in the Bible takes us from A to Z
- 3. We could easily spend months studying this psalm.
  - a. Famous preacher Charles Spurgeon has 398 pages on it in his Treasury of David.
  - b. Charles Simeon has 19 sermons on random verses from it.
  - c. Today, we're going to limit it to the verse 11 verses which covers it well.

# VERSES 1-3

<sup>1</sup>Blessed are those whose ways are blameless, who walk according to the law of the LORD.

<sup>2</sup> Blessed are those who keep his statutes and seek him with all their heart—

<sup>3</sup> they do no wrong but follow his ways.

- \*As I mentioned, this psalm has 176 total verses/couplets and here's what is fascinating:
  - a. Only 3 to 5 of the couplets lack a direct reference to the written Word of God \*In case you're curious: 84, 90?, 121, 122, and 132?
  - b. So throughout this chapter, certain words feature more prominently.
- 1. The first word is **LAW**, used in Verse 1, appearing 25 times in this psalm.
  - a. We always think of this negatively. It's the word for TORAH, the books of Moses.
  - b. The Jews understand this as "teaching," a healthier way to view
    - 1) What can God teach you?
    - 2) The law reveals God's will for how His people are to live.
    - 3) It's not just for academic interest, but for obedience.
- 2. The second word is **STATUTES**. It's used 10 times in this psalm
  - a. The word comes from the root meaning "to bear witness."
  - b. It points to the dependability of the Bible as a witness of things of God.
- 3. The third word here is **WAYS**, appearing 7 times in Psalm 119.

- a. It refers to God's characteristic manner of acting
- b. When contrasted with our ways, it looks completely different.
- c. What we need to realize: THE SCRIPTURES ARE CONSISTENT
  - 1) The blessings of this worldview: we don't change what we believe.
  - 2) Verse 137: "You are righteous, LORD, and your laws are right."

## VERSES 4-7

<sup>4</sup>You have laid down precepts that are to be fully obeyed.

- <sup>5</sup> Oh, that my ways were steadfast in obeying your decrees!
- <sup>6</sup>Then I would not be put to shame when I consider all your commands.
- <sup>7</sup>I will praise you with an upright heart as I learn your righteous laws.
- 1. The word **PRECEPTS** appears 21 times in this Psalm.
  - a. The word refers to overseeing or paying close attention to a matter.
  - b. It speaks to a God who cares about detail"
    - 1) This needn't be oppressive, but can be liberating
    - 2) Our obedience should come somewhat naturally.
- 2. Here we have the word **DECREES**. It's found 22 times in Psalm 119.
  - a. It comes from a word meaning "to engrave in stone"
  - b. Why are cemetery memorials made out of stone? Permanence.
- 3. The word **COMMANDS** is also found 22 times in this chapter.
  - a. It points to "the straight authority of what is said"
  - b. There is no confusion here: it has the idea of giving orders.
- 4. The word **RIGHTEOUS LAWS** or **JUDGMENTS** or **ORDINANCES** is 23 times in this psalm.
  - a. Here, justice is rooted in God's character.
  - b. These decisions from the ultimate all-wise Judge about common human situations
  - c. As with any judge, we get this lesson: THE SCRIPTURES ARE AUTHORITATIVE
    - 1) This is not just fascinating literature, it's meant to direct our lives.
    - 2) Verse 73: "Your hands made me and formed me; give me understanding to learn your commands."

## VERSES 8-11

<sup>8</sup> I will obey your decrees; do not utterly forsake me.

<sup>9</sup> How can a young person stay on the path of purity? By living according to your word.

- <sup>10</sup>I seek you with all my heart; do not let me stray from your commands.
- <sup>11</sup> I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you.
- 1. In this text, we want to highlight the same word twice. And that is **WORD**.
  - a. The word d'bar appears 23x in the psalm
  - b. The word *im'rah* appears 19x in the psalm)
- 2. WORD has become synonymous with the Bible itself. It's a powerful metaphor.
  - a. This was the emphasis for the name of our church. An aural metaphor.
- b. Romans 10:17,18 Faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word about Christ. But I ask: Did they not hear? Of course they did: Their voice has gone out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world.
  - C. THE SCRIPTURES ARE ILLUMINATING
    - 1) They word from inside out to transform how we live and move.
    - 2) Verse 105 "Your word is a lamp for my feet, a light on my path."

## CONCLUSION

- 1. Maybe you're into Marvel superhero movies.
  - a. While these are the cream of the crop, the DC universe have Superman/Batman.

b. Those two characters have dozens of feature length movies about them.

- 1) And yet those movies STILL bring in money.
- 2) Between comics, TV shows, and movies, there's been about 18 incarnations of Superman alone.
- c. And still, it doesn't get old.
- 2. It's critical that we understand that the story of Scriptures never should get old to us.
  - a. It lasts. As we change, its meaning changes in our lives.
  - b. This is why we must continually go back to it.
  - c. Verse 1 "Blessed are those . . . who walk according to the law of the Lord."
